Your opportunities!

As a student at Lund University, you have great opportunities to spend a part of your time as a student abroad. Lund University sends out and receives a couple of thousand students every year through its many exchange agreements, whereby Lund University has agreed with a partner university in another country to “exchange students”. In this way, the studies undertaken by Lund University students at the partner university are not subject to any tuition fees. All the partner universities are very well-reputed, they entitle you to student financing and credits from studies undertaken there can be transferred to your degree at Lund University, *on condition that the courses correspond to the requirements from your department at Lund University.*

There are three different possible procedures for a Lund University student who wants to study abroad:

1. Subject-specific exchange places

In order to apply for subject-specific exchange places, find out directly from your department and/or faculty what agreements are in place. Always start by doing this! Above all, there are agreements with European Universities with the possibility of applying for Erasmus or Nordplus grants at the departments.

2. University-wide exchange places within LUUP

The university-wide exchange places within LUUP (Lund University’s general exchange programme) can be applied for by all students at the University regardless of subject area. These places are administrated by the international student mobility group at Student Services. Remember that you can *only* apply for an exchange via LUUP to the universities with which your department/faculty does *not* have any agreement. If an agreement exists at your department/faculty, you must apply through that.

The advantage of studying within one of the exchange programmes of the University (LUUP), the faculty or the department is that you do not have to pay any tuition fees and that you can get help with your application to the host university.

3. Independent applications

You can also apply independently to higher education institutions abroad. Then you make all the arrangements yourself; from contacting the institutions to arranging the practical details. You must, for example, check with CSN whether you can get student financing at the university you choose. You must also talk to your department about credit transfers for your future degree.

This handbook provides guidelines for those who wish to apply for studies abroad via LUUP!

Autumn application period 1 Oct - 1 Nov

During the autumn you can apply for study places at partner universities in:

- Asia • North America • Latin America • Lebanon
- Global Issues Programme

Spring application period 15 Feb - 15 March

During the spring you can apply for study places at partner universities in:

- Australia • New Zealand • Europe • Nordic Area • Russia
- Global Issues Programme
- Summer courses at U21 Universities
- Summer courses in Asia
- U21 Undergraduate Research Conference

Admission requirements

General requirements

You are eligible to apply for a LUUP exchange if:

- You are registered as a full-time student at Lund University at the time of application or have been granted approved leave from a programme at Lund University
- You have achieved at least 30 higher education credits at the time of application
- You submit a Study Plan containing courses equivalent to full-time studies which will be eligible for credit transfer within a degree at Lund University
- You have sufficient proficiency in the relevant language of instruction or you can show on request a plan for how you intend to acquire such proficiency before your departure

Please note!

Certain partner universities can set specific admission requirements, such as language test results. Specific admission requirements for each university can be found in the “university information” which is available on the web during the application periods.

Faculty-specific admission requirements

In addition to the general requirements, there may be specific requirements at your faculty or department:

Faculty of Law

- Students must have completed three years of the Bachelor of Laws programme

- All courses in semesters 1-5 and the mandatory course in International Law must have been completed and exams passed at the time of departure
- Students must demonstrate the relevant language skills

Faculty of Engineering (LTH)

- At least 60 credits achieved through passed exams or transferred within the programme (120 credits for NORDTEK)
- Backlog in the general block of courses may not exceed 15 credits
- A minimum grade average of 4.0 is required for some universities
- A preliminary study plan is to be approved by the programme director

Faculty of Science

As a rule, the basic block of courses should be completed before departure (2 years).

Faculties of Humanities and Theology

Applicants are to have achieved at least 30 credits in the subject they intend to study abroad.

Preparations

Get started early!

The LUUP application is made at least six months before the actual exchange (for Europe for example) and even up to just over a year in advance (for example for an autumn semester in New Zealand). It takes time to choose a university and to put the application together. You must find out for yourself about another educational and university system. In some countries, the university system is national, as it is in Sweden, but in others there may be differences between universities within the country. Be prepared to dedicate around 15-20 hours' work if you want to maximise the number of applications (max five universities).

Applying via LUUP or via the department/faculty?

Via LUUP you can apply to study at many universities outside Europe and in the Nordic area, as well as at some universities in the rest of Europe. You will find a list of partner universities relevant to LUUP student exchanges at the end of this handbook. However, the available universities can vary from year to year.

Most of the agreements on student exchange for universities in Europe and the Nordic area are established at the department and faculty levels and you should always start by finding out what agreements are in place within your subject area, the so-called subject-specific exchange places. For studies at universities in Europe/the Nordic area it is possible to apply for a small cash scholarship (Erasmus or Nordplus scholarship).

Information meetings

During the application periods in spring and autumn, the international student mobility group holds information meetings on two occasions. Dates and times are announced on our website. These meetings present some of the universities that you can apply to via LUUP and provide information on how to plan work on your application.

STARS - Study Abroad Report System

In the STARS database you can read about other students' experiences of their exchange studies, for example what they thought of the university where they studied, the courses, the accommodation and the social activities. You can search for the country or the university you are interested in and find travel reports from students who have been there in the past. Information on universities and application codes

During the application periods you can find information about our partner universities on the web. Under "university information" you can read about the language of instruction, restrictions, the number of credits that make up full-time studies at the host university* and so on. If the information is missing, that is because we have not received such information from that particular partner university. In that case, you have to try and find it out for yourself, by looking up the university's own website for example.

Occasionally the departments at LU estimate that what the host university considers to be full-time studies does not correspond to full-time studies at LU. If you are selected, it is your responsibility to check how many credits at your host university are considered to correspond to full-time studies at your department. The department transfers the credits from your studies abroad.

Finding courses

Finding suitable courses and putting together a study plan is the hardest and most time-consuming part of your application. In the university information on the web you can find links to the universities' course pages. Always start by reading the contents of the university information. Remember that it is your responsibility to find suitable courses on the universities' web course pages.

Choosing courses

In the initial stage, deciding which courses are suitable is up to you. You have to find out about the various universities' education systems and range of courses. Don't base your judgement on what the Swedish university system is like; it could be that the third year of studies in Lund corresponds to the second or the fourth year at a university abroad. Instead, start from what you need and want, in other words courses which are at the appropriate level, which match your programme and taken together constitute full-time studies at the host university. What constitutes full-time study is set out in the "university information" on the web. Be sure to check carefully what prior knowledge is required to follow the courses which interest you.

Bear in mind that not all the courses in a university course directory are necessarily available to exchange students. Find out whether the university has any such restrictions in the "university information" open during the application period: <http://interbas.intsek.lu.se/luup/univLista.lasso>

The choice of courses you state in your application is by no means absolute. The range of courses for the semester/year you are applying for is often not available at the time of application. You must base your choice on the range of courses which is current at the time of application. Most often, the range of courses does not change significantly from one academic year to another. If you are selected, your choice of courses can be altered several times before you finally begin your period of exchange studies. The final decision on the courses to which you are admitted is up to the host university. The courses you choose must be approved by your study advisor /programme director in order to allow subsequent credit transfer for a degree at Lund University.

How to apply

Application codes

You can indicate up to five options in your application; these can be five different universities or the same university but different study periods. The more universities you indicate in your application the more likely it is that you will be selected. Choose and rank your options in order of preference.

The application codes you need to complete the application form can be found on the web. It is very important to fill in the correct codes as they indicate which university and which study period you are applying for as well as the application period in which you are filing your application. Please note that “spring” always refers to the first half of the calendar year (i.e. regardless of the season in the host country).

NB! Students from the Faculty of Engineering (LTH) and the Faculty of Science are to rank all the universities in their application, including the ones they are applying to via special agreements with their faculty/ department. This applies only to the autumn LUUP application.

Application forms

Application forms are only available on the web during the application periods, that is 1 October-1 November and 15 February-15 March.

Before you fill in the form you must have decided on the following:

Where you want to go and in which period (application codes)

Which courses you intend to study at the various universities

You cannot save a partially completed application and go back to it!

If for some reason you have filled in several electronic applications – which you are kindly requested to avoid – the application that you have most recently printed, signed and handed in to the Registrar together with the attachments will apply.

Please note that only the requested attachments should be included with the application. No other documents, no matter what they may be, will be taken into account so they should therefore not be attached. **ONE** application form and **ONE** copy of each attachment are to be put into five **IDENTICAL** sets. Each set of documents is to contain one copy of each document as they will be sent to various offices within Lund University. **Please note** that only complete applications submitted on time will be processed!

Application and attachments

Study Plan

You must submit a Study Plan for each university and period you are applying for. It is important that your Study Plan should contain the following information:

- Your name
- Chosen university
- Subject area, course title, course codes (if available), and credits
- Semester in which the course is given
- Alternative courses you could consider, if the ones you have chosen are not available

At the International Desk at Student Services and on www.lu.se/luup there is a template for a Study Plan showing which information needs to be included. Remember that your Study Plan is not definitive. It can be altered many times before you finally begin your exchange study period.

Specific for autumn applications

For applications to the MAUI network, the North Carolina Consortium, the Crepuq network and ITESM (37 campuses) which are advertised in the autumn, you must submit a Study Plan for each university/campus you are interested in, but *with a maximum of three*.

For the University of California, which has eight campuses, you must submit Study Plans for *three* of these campuses.

Please note that the universities/networks listed above each constitute just ONE (of five) options in your LUUP application.

Specific for spring applications

For applications to summer courses and the U21 Undergraduate Research Conference, you do not need to submit a Study Plan. However where necessary you are to indicate which courses/ specializations you are interested in at the various universities.

U21 Undergraduate Research Conference

Students whose Bachelor's or Master's degree projects have received a grade of pass with distinction have the opportunity to present it at U21's weeklong Undergraduate Research Conference. The conference takes place during the summer at one of the U21 universities. Three students (and a lecturer) are selected and provided with a scholarship along with the opportunity to publish their degree project in the Oculus journal, which is published by the University of Virginia. You apply to the conference in the same way as for the rest of LUUP, but instead of a Study Plan you must submit an abstract in English (150-200 words), a copy of your project and a letter of recommendation from your supervisor. Please contact the International Desk for further details.

Global Issues Programme

Exchange studies and/or online studies in an international context.

The Global Issues Programme (GIP) is an interdisciplinary exchange programme focused on globalisation. The GIP is a flexible exchange programme which gives students the opportunity to study at one of the GIP universities as well as the opportunity to study online in an international environment at home. The programme comprises four courses worth 7.5 credits each. All courses can be studied over one semester, but most students opt to spread the studies over several semesters. At least two of the courses are to be online courses and one must be a so-called "core course". You can apply for the GIP both in the autumn and in the spring.

Contact the International Desk for more information about GIP, "core courses", eligibility and application procedure.

Transcripts from Ladok (UT10)

Ask your department administrator for a transcript from Ladok (UT10) with all your data. If you have studied at another university or higher education institution you must also attach a transcript concerning that part of your education. Arrange to do this in good time!

Statement of Purpose

In your Statement of Purpose (objectives and incentives) you must explain why you want to study abroad. This document can weigh heavily in the selection process and should be carefully formulated. It must include an explanation of how the planned studies tie in with your main subject at Lund University and what benefits you stand to get from your studies abroad in the future. You are only to write ONE Statement of Purpose which is to include your motivation for choosing all the selected universities. The text is to be written in English or in the language of instruction of the host university and must be no longer than one A4 page. If you are writing in any language other than English you must also include a Swedish translation.

CV

Your Curriculum Vitae must include your education and course credits, any language certificates, working experience and other activities relevant to your application. It is to be no longer than one A4 page and written in English. You are not to attach grades, work certificates or other such documents to back up your CV. On www.lu.se/luup you can find examples of CVs.

Checklist

1. Fill in the application form on the web.
2. Print out and sign the application form.
3. Attach a passport type photo, with glue or tape (no paper clips!)
4. Write your CV.
5. Write a Statement of Purpose.
6. Ask your department administrator to print out a LADOK (UT10) transcript. If you have studied at another higher education institution, arrange to get a transcript from there as well.
7. Write a Study Plan for each option you are applying for.
8. Make four copies of all the application documents so that you get five identical sets with the application form on the top of each pile. Staple each pile together.

NB! Only complete applications submitted on time will be processed!

The completed application

Once you have filled in the application form and sent it off via the web you must print it out, sign it, stick a passport type photograph onto it and add the other attachments. All documents are to be copied four times, so that you get five identical sets of papers.

The Registrar is part of the Legal Division and is located in the Byrålogen building, Paradisgatan 5C. You can also submit your application there in person. At the main entrance there is a special mailbox for the Registrar only. **Your application documents must have reached the Registrar at the latest at 24:00 on 15 March or 1 November respectively.**

If the deadline falls on a weekend, the applications will be received up to and including the following Monday at 24:00.

Please note! Your LUUP application must only be handed in/sent to the Registrar, not to the International Student Mobility Group or any other unit, department or faculty.

Only complete applications submitted on time will be processed. In the application, the student is to have taken account of the relevant host university's indications concerning courses available to exchange students.

Selection process

Your application to LUUP is managed by Lund University alone. It does not go to the universities that you indicate as options in your application. It takes about 6-7 weeks to complete the selection process. If you are selected by Lund University you are to put together a new application, this time to the host university, under the guidance of the international student mobility group. It is up to the host university to take the final decision on admission. It is very rare for a selected student not to be admitted by the host university.

After the application deadline, the following happens:

- The applications, which have been continuously registered by the Registrar, are forwarded to the international student mobility group
- Complete applications are sent to the respective faculties
- The faculties rank the applications according to general and faculty-specific ranking criteria
- The international student mobility group receives the rankings established by the faculties and puts together a selection proposal
- The selection proposal is discussed with faculty representatives
- A selection proposal on which all parties agree is presented to the head of Student Services, who takes the decision on approval
- The selection decision is announced about seven weeks after the application deadline on the noticeboard outside the International Desk at Student Services. The decision on selection is sent home by post to the selected students. The affected supervisors and applicants who have not been selected are informed via e-mail
- The selected students are invited to a meeting at Student Services with a view to compiling a new application to the relevant host universities

NB! Special selection process

Because of a tighter time frame, applications to summer courses, the U21 Undergraduate Research Conference, U21 Summer School and universities in Europe, the Nordic area and Russia are read and ranked by the international student mobility group. The selection decision is taken about 3-5 weeks after the application deadline. Students are contacted in order to confirm that they accept the place offered to them.

The University of California also has a tighter time frame. Ranking is done at the faculties and sent to the international student mobility group which makes a selection proposal together with UC Study Center. The proposal is discussed with representatives from the faculties. The students are contacted within 4 weeks to confirm whether they accept the place offered.

Ranking

General ranking criteria

- Study results – higher education credits and grades
- Relevance of studies for the programme - Study Plan and possibility for credit transfer from the courses
- Objectives and incentives - Statement of Purpose
- Secondary qualifications (CV)

Faculty-specific ranking criteria

School of Economics and Management

Contact the International Coordinator at EHL for details.

Faculty of Law

Applications are ranked by weighing up the overall impression created by the Study Plan, the Statement of Purpose and how far the applicant has progressed within the Law degree programme.

The Malmö Faculty of Fine and Performing Arts

No special eligibility requirements, except artistic maturity and skill. The faculty coordinator collects the applications and obtains the information relevant to the ranking process from the various programme managements.

Faculty of Engineering (LTH)

In May 2010 the Dean of LTH took a new decision regarding guidelines for eligibility, assessment, ranking and selection for exchange studies which is applicable as of the 2010/2011 academic year. Contact the International Coordinator at LTH for further details.

Faculty of Medicine

Ranking is done by comprehensively weighing up the overall impression of the students' purposefulness as expressed in the Study Plan, the Statement of Purpose, study results and language skills.

Faculty of Science

- The student must have followed the nominal rate of study
- Study results and total credits. The proportion of passes with distinction is taken into consideration to a certain extent, but an applicant with a lower grade average can take precedence over one with a higher grade average because of other qualifications
- A student who is at the early stage of his or her studies can be left aside in favour of one who is further ahead, since the former will have the opportunity to apply again
- Social maturity

A ranking of applicants is done within each subject. These subject rankings are compiled by the international officer at the faculty into a ranking list for the whole faculty, where the ambition is a representative selection of different subjects.

Faculties of Humanities and Theology

- The most relevant academic qualification in relation to the subject areas the applicant intends to study student must have followed the nominal rate of study
- Other academic training that the applicant has undergone outside the Swedish university system and which can be considered relevant
- To a certain extent, the proportion of passes with distinction in the total credits achieved is taken into account
- Better opportunities for in-depth study at the host university
- Personal characteristics, experiences, activities that are deemed to be relevant to profit from exchange studies and/or to benefit from one's stay abroad
- A certain importance is attached to subject distribution – an applicant with fewer credits may sometimes be ranked higher than another with more credits
- The faculties strive to achieve equal gender distribution
- Statements from the students' departments are obtained before the ranking list is established
- The subjects that the student intends to study abroad must be included in the faculties of humanities and theology

Faculty of Social Sciences

- The general criteria are weighed up together with the experiences, activities, etc. that are deemed to be relevant in order to benefit from exchange studies.
- There is to be a certain distribution between the genders and between students studying different subjects and at different levels (undergraduate and master's levels)

The international student mobility group makes the final selection

The international student mobility group makes sure that there is a fair distribution over the faculties and subject areas in relation to both the number of students wishing to go abroad and the number of incoming exchange students the faculties are hosting. When several students are judged to be equally eligible, a gender perspective can be taken into consideration. Experience as an international mentor is deemed to be a merit.

Credit transfer

As an exchange student, you are still a student at Lund University. You cannot obtain your degree from the host university abroad. It must be possible to transfer the credits from the studies you undertake there towards a degree at Lund University. The various faculties have different requirements for credit transfer. As a student at the Faculty of Engineering (LTH), for example, you must fill in the form entitled "Study contract for LTH students going abroad" and get it approved, together with a prearranged study plan for studies abroad, by the relevant programmes board. Check with your department what the procedure is in your case. You are responsible for ensuring that credits for your studies abroad can be transferred.

How to finance your studies

If you are admitted to an LUUP student exchange, you have the right to take your student finance with you abroad. In most cases, it is also possible to borrow extra money for travel and insurance. Contact CSN for more information. The telephone number is 0771-276 000, open 08.00-16.30. www.csn.se

Scholarships and grants
